During the eight years in the area, I also worked as a school nurse, camp nurse, and taught in an LPN program and had two children. During the now storm, neighbors had a plan to pull me out on a toboggan to the hospital, a plan which didn't appeal to me. of IONE- Indiana Organization of Nurse
Executives. Currently, I serve on the Goodwill
Board, President of Maryvale Board (senior
living apartments in WTH), Terre Haute
Rotary Club and am a member of Centenary
United Methodist Church.

Lou and I moved to Westminster Village in August 2022, and while the move from the home we had designed was difficult, we knew it was the right decision. We still enjoyed playing bridge and golf, but my tennis ended after two knee replacements.
